The World Around Me

<u>City Life</u>

Living in a city (especially a large city) may mean that a family has less room because cities can be crowded. Some families living in larger cities and apartments aren't able to have their own washer and dryer, so they go to the Laundromat to wash and dry their clothes. What other ways is big city life different? You may want to discuss public transportation (many people use the public transportation system because they don't have room to store a car); you may also want to discuss that in big cities, the houses and apartment buildings are close together which doesn't allow for large yards and play areas. Children in big cities play at the city parks.

<u>People</u>

Look through the illustrations of the book. You'll see people with different clothing styles, different colors of skin, and even someone who sounds different (the owner of the laundromat speaks Spanish). On the very first page there is a woman on the sidewalk wearing a sari (probably a woman from India). In the laundromat, there is an individual who is Asian, and later we see the owner is Hispanic and speaks Spanish.

God made everyone different & beautiful, and those differences may come in dressing a certain way because that is the way it is done in another country, or speaking a different language, etc. It is lovely to see everyone in this story living so nicely together in a community.

Occupations

Discuss what an artist is-- a person skilled in one of the arts (as painting, sculpture, music, or writing). Discuss that some make a living by being an artist.

Where does your student's daddy (and other relatives) work? What other jobs do people have? How many different jobs can you and your student think of?

Language Arts

<u>Vocabulary</u>

laundromat- a place where people can go and use for self-service laundry beret- a soft flat wool cap without a visor studio- a place where an artist works dizzy- causing one to feel as if they are moving in circles

Practice Writing Your Name

Let your student practice writing his name this week. If you are making a lapbook, print the pocket and let your student put his name inside the pocket.

Art

Painting

Let your student be an artist! Give her a palette of various colors and let her mix them together, as desired. Give her a piece of circle shaped paper and take some of the artist's inspiration-- paint a dryer with clothes swirling around.

Fabric and Textures

Let your student play with some scraps of fabric. Some ideas include: denim, satiny, corduroy, knit, cotton/woven, burlap, felt, etc. You can do lots of different things with the fabric. Here are some ideas:

1. Cut the fabric into pieces and glue on paper to make a texture picture

2. Try sewing with a needle and thread (your student may even want to try sewing a button or a pocket on a piece of fabric).

3. Use words to describe the feeling of each kind of fabric (fuzzy, smooth, soft, silky, rough)

4. Cut two swatches of each fabric and place one of each pair into a brown sack. Give your student one of the fabrics that you didn't put in the bag (i.e. silk). Let her feel it for a few seconds. Tell her to reach into the bag (without looking) and try to find the matching piece.

Bible and Character

Being a Good Listener

It's important to learn to listen to mommy and daddy! Corduroy didn't listen to Lisa's words, and because of that he ended up being lost/left behind/and in a cage. Safety depends on listening and obeying your mom and dad. You may want to use Ephesians 6:1 as a memory verse for the week.

Being a Good Neighbor

The artist is very kind to take care of Corduroy's overalls, and leave him nicely at the laundromat to be found by Lisa. Discuss ways to be a good neighbor to the people around you. Read the story of the Good Samaritan to your student. Go-along video-- Veggie Tales "Are You My Neighbor?"

Jesus Loves...

Sing "Jesus Love the Little Children" together and discuss that Jesus loves all kinds of different people! (This is probably best to do after you've discussed the "People" lesson).

Life Skills


<u>Laundry</u>

Let your student help you sort, wash, dry, fold, and put away laundry this week!




Cut book out on solid black lines. Fold in thirds on dotted lines.

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
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


Cut out book as one piece. Fold left side in. Fold right side in. Open book. Cut on dotted line to form two flaps. Refold book.


Cut pictures out and paste to appropriate spaces. Cut both strips out on previous page. Glue as indicated. Fold like an accordion and paste back of last piece to your lapbook.




Assemble pocket- Cut each one out as one piece. Fold bottom piece up. Fold flaps around the back and glue down



Cut out rectangle as one piece. Fold on solid lines. You should have a book that opens like the "shutters" on a window. Cover on second page

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
Cut out rectangles. Stack together (smallest to largest) with cover on top and staple.





A Pocket for Corduroy

Cut book out. Fold on lines (matchbook style)






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This is a pop-up book. First, print book on cardstock. Mountain fold the book in half on the dotted line. Snip the two solid lines. Fold that flap down towards you on the dotted line. Now, valley fold the book in half, on the dotted line, popping the box to the inside of the book. Cut out the small rectangle and paste or draw a picture on it. On the box marked "glue" glue the item you want to pop-up sitting level with the paper. Make sure it lies flat when closing the book.
